

CAMPUS:

Main campus conveniently located in downtown Raleigh, Wake County. Approximately 139 miles from Charlotte, NC, 261 miles from Washington, DC and 380 miles from Atlanta, GA. Within 20 miles from Raleigh/Durham International Airport. Within 2 miles from Amtrak and Greyhound. Easy access to interstates 40, 85, and 95. Expanded educational opportunities via the College of Adult and Professional Education (CAPE) at nine (9) sites in North Carolina, including: Ahoskie, Asheville, Durham, Fayetteville, High Point, Kannapolis, Raleigh, Rocky Mount, and Wilmington.

HISTORY:

First historically Black college in the South and among the oldest in the nation. A church-affiliated (Baptist) institution, originally founded in 1865 to teach freedmen theology and biblical interpretation. Established the nation's first four-year medical school and the first female dormitory on a coeducational campus. The Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee (SNCC) began at a conference held on Shaw's campus in 1960.
